
## Introduction

- 169 faculty members have been interviewed




## Number and Percentage of Faculty Interviewed by Geographic Area of Study

## Research Pratices of Scholars in Asian Studies at the University of Colorado Boulder

## Xiang Li, Chinese & Asian Studies Librarian

#### **Key Findings**

- More Complex and Multifaceted Information Needs
- Scholar as Collector
- Conservative Adoption of Digital Research

#### **Main Recommendations**

- Collection Development
- Library Services



## Findings 1: More Complex and Multifaceted Information Needs

- Increasing research interests on Asia from all disciplines
- Scholars draw from a variety of disciplines to do their research
- Research has become larger in scope and more complex
- Growing emphasis on cross-cultural analysis and cross-national perspective



## Findings 2: Scholar as Collector

- Materials purchased from overseas bookstores
- Photocopied materials that were interlibrary loaned
- Materials produced while visiting Asian libraries or archives
- Data collected while conducting field work



## Findings 3: Conservative Adoption of Digital Research

- Digital materials are widely accepted and sometimes preferred
- Digital discovery tools are highly valued
- Digital Information management tools are in low adoption
- Digital research methods do not appear to be widely utilized



## Main Recommendations: Collection Development

- Revise the collection development policy to better support interdisciplinary and multicultural studies
- Encourage scholars to purchase materials for the Libraries during their research trips to Asia
- Encourage scholars to donate their personal collections to the library
- Continue to advance Interlibrary Loan service and enhance borrowing partnerships, especially with libraries in Asia

## Main Recommendations: Library Services

- Develop training programs on digital research methods specific to Asian Studies
- Work with graduate students to develop digital humanities projects in Asian Studies
- Provide information and/or training on information management and preservation, including those for print and digital resources
- Provide support for identifying and adopting citation management tools that best address Asian Studies scholars' needs

## The Claremont Colleges: Institutional Setting and Asian Studies

- A consortium that combines the specialization, flexibility, and personal attention of a college with the resources of a university
- Asian studies deeply rooted in the curriculum
  - One of the earliest Asian studies program among liberal arts colleges
- Rigorous research output along with great emphasis on course development, teaching, and high-touch student engagement
- The Asian Library: Renewed focus and support to Asia studies

## Claremont Findings: Research Focus & Methods

- Balancing teaching and research in a liberal arts college context
  - Magic wand: "lighter course load"
- Research focus
  - Some 'traditional' textual translation and analysis
  - Many intercultural, interdisciplinary
- Research method
  - Some discipline-driven
  - More interdisciplinary in scope and methodology

## Claremont Findings: **Information Access & Discovery**

- Importance of primary sources
  - "I can't do anything without going to archives"
- Liberal arts setting
  - Not expecting library to own specialized Asian materials they need for their research projects
- Concern with lack of Asian primary sources
  - Perspectives are limited even missing in the sources available
- Acess to primary sources
  - Heavy reliance on ILL
  - Heavy reliance on traveling to foreign archives

## Claremont Findings: **Dissemination Practices**

- Traditional channels and practice
  - Peer reviewed; academic
- OA channel
  - Support in theory /concept; concerns
- Importance of dissemination to general public and interest
  - "Go beyond just talking to each other; get this information out"
- Importance of making research accessible to Asian scholars
  - Obligation to bridge the "information divide"

## Claremont Findings: State of the Asian Studies Field

- Expanding in subjects and regions
  - "Rethink what is Asia, what is Asian Studies"
- Challenges
  - Stay focused; limited access
- Opportunities
  - Changing student demographics in Asian Studies class
  - More cross region/country, multidisciplinary projects
  - Rise of digital humanities projects

## Recommendations: The Claremont Colleges

- Partner with other subject librarians and strategize ways to meet the disciplinary research needs of Asian Studies
- Proactively connect the collections to faculty research projects and highlight the projects that use Asian Library materials
- Involve faculty in digitizing the library's unique and rare Asian materials, and make the digitized collections accessible online to the worldwide community of scholars
- Creating and strengthening relationships with libraries and publishers in Asia in order to increase resource sharing in support of faculty research
