Description: The Queer Japan Web Archive of the Ivy Plus Libraries Confederation is a joint initiative by librarians for Japanese Studies at Brown, Columbia, Duke, Harvard, Princeton, and Yale Universities and the University of Pennsylvania, with support from Dr. Yoshie Yanagihara (Tokyo Denki University), Dr. Tetsuyuki Shida (Waseda University), and Patrick Carland (University of Pennsylvania). The Archive aims to preserve websites created by non-profit Japanese organizations which research, advocate for, support, and provide services to LGBTQ communities. The non-profit organizations included in the Archive provide social services for LGBTQ communities throughout Japan, such as quality of life services, real estate, employment, educational assistance, helplines, workshops, mental health services, information about sexually transmitted diseases, and legal information. From May 2020 onward, the project members expanded their collecting scope to include websites created by university clubs, the municipalities that recognize same-sex partnerships, and organizers of LGBTQ-related parades and local events. By archiving these websites, the Confederation strives to guarantee that these potentially ephemeral websites are preserved and remain browsable by researchers and scholars.
